MOTHER'S DAY NATURE CRAFT. Sat., May 12, 10 a.m. Kids, make a handmade nature craft to give as a Mother's Day gift. Ages 5+. Reservations required beginning Wed., May 2.

SECOND SATURDAY SETTLERS: LYE SOAP. *Sat., May 12, 1-3 p.m.* Visit Redbud Hill Homestead to learn how early Texas settlers made this old-fashioned all-purpose cleaner and watch as demonstrators bring the homestead to life.

DRAGONFLY WORKSHOP. Sat., May 19, 9 a.m.-noon. Join a Citizen Science project to help monitor the three beautiful migratory dragonflies that move through this region, and learn how to identify their characteristics. Then take a walk to the park's waterways to practice photographing and identifying them.

JUNE

NATIONAL TRAILS DAY: CREEK BASH. Sat., June 2, 9 a.m. Nothing ruins a scenic waterway faster than litter. Join us to help keep Spring Creek clean and make an impact on the environment for future generations. Wear suitable clothing. All ages welcome; ages 16+ only for canoeing clean-up. Reservations required beginning Wed., May 23.

WATER ECOLOGY WORKSHOP. Sat., June 2, 1 p.m. Are you curious about what lives in the park's waterways? Find out in this hands-on investigation with dips nets, seines, and water quality testing. Wear suitable clothing Ages 10+ Reservations required beginning Wed., May 23.

SECOND SATURDAY SETTLERS: BASKET WEAVING. Sat., June 9, 1-3 p.m. Visit Redbud Hill Homestead to learn how natural materials are used to make baskets of all types. Join

staff and volunteers as they bring the homestead to life and demonstrate the daily activities of early Texas setters.

ALL ABOUT TEXAS BATS. *Saturday, June 16, 10 a.m.* Curious about bats? Join Heartwood Texas Master Naturalist Mari Hanley to discover which bat species are found in Harris County, the role they play in the wild, threats they face, what makes them so vital to the balance of life, and how you can be involved in monitoring. *All ages*.

SNAKES OF HARRIS COUNTY. Sat., June 23, 10 a.m. Though many snakes are common in the Houston area, only a few pose any danger to humans and many are very beneficial. Come out for an opportunity to learn how to identify the most common venomous and non-venomous snakes in our area.

BITES, STINGS & ITCHES. Sat., June 23, 1 p.m. Learn about summer outdoor hazards such as poison ivy, venomous snakes, and dangerous arthropods, and see why there's no reason to fear the outdoors. This class includes tips on avoiding bites and stings, and how to treat their effects.

FISH OF SPRING CREEK. *Sat.*, *June 30*, *10 a.m.* Join a staff naturalist to learn about the common local freshwater fish species, and then watch TPWD electro-shock boat reveal what lives in Spring Creek. *Ages 8+. Reservations required beginning Wed.*, *June 20.*

JULY

TEXAS BOUND! *Thurs., July 5, 9 a.m.-2 p.m.* Kids are invited to a fun-filled, one-day camp. Using props and hands-on activities, team up in "families" for a journey to Texas. Find out if you have what it takes to survive the hardships of earlier times and re-create a homestead of your own. *Ages 7-12. Reservations required beginning Wed., June 27.*

JUNIOR CANOE TRAINING. Fri.., July 6, 9 a.m.-2 p.m. Kids can hit the water to earn a Jones Park Paddler's card. The card allows participation in future park-sponsored canoe trips with an accompanying adult. Ages 10-15 only. Reservations required beginning Wed., June 27.

INATURALIST. *Sat.*, *July 7, 10 a.m.* iNaturalist is one of many citizen science programs that allow users to document what's in the world around them. This program will introduce visitors to iNaturalist, how to use it, and why it's important to Jones Park. Ages 8+.

PERIOD CLOTHING WORKSHOP. Sat., July 14, 9 a.m. Learn about the Texas pioneer family and how their life struggles influenced clothing choices. The abundancy or scarcity of many supplies played a large role in what a family wore and how they wore it. Reservations required beginning Wed., June 27.

SECOND SATURDAY SETTLERS: HUNTER TRAPPER. *Sat.*, *July 14, 1-3 p.m.* Visit the Akokisa Indian Village to engage in 19th century hunting and trapping techniques and witness other daily activities at Redbud Hill Homestead.

WILDLIFE REHABILITATION. Saturday, July 21, 10 a.m. Learn about wildlife rehabilitation and how humans can coexist with animals, as licensed wildlife rehabilitators from the Wildlife Center of Texas show off and discuss their education ambassador animals. All ages.

NATIVE TREE ID WALK. *Sat.*, *July 28, 1 p.m.* Join a staff naturalist on a walk to learn how to identify native trees using bark, twigs, and other characteristics.

AUGUST

BACKYARD REPTILES. *Sat.*, *Aug. 4, 10 a.m.* Learn about the most common frogs, toads, lizards, turtles and snakes that live in Harris County, how to identify them, and the benefits they provide us.
